FOUR HONEST BOOKS ABOUT DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

This Christmas we're supporting Refuge, the charity for those affected by domestic violence. Here are four books that tackle the issue.

- **1.** *Into The Darkest Corner* by Elizabeth Haynes (Myriad Editions, £7.99) Haynes was inspired by her work as a police intelligence analyst to write the fictional account of Catherine, who falls for Lee. However, Lee's jealous, controlling nature is soon revealed and the story explores how those experiencing domestic violence often feel they're at fault.
- **2.** *The End Of Emily West* by Wendy Turner Webster (Author House, £7.99) An especially brave book given that the author drew on her own experience of domestic violence during her first marriage. In the novel, Emily's world is torn apart when she meets Darren. Their relationship drags her into a world of violence and



exploitation.

3. This Charming Man by Marian Keyes (Penguin, £7.99) Paddy de Courcy is a charismatic Irish politician who has touched the lives of four very different women – Grace the journalist, Lola his girlfriend, Alicia his fiancée and Marnie, Grace's sister. A novel that's both light and dark, it's full of Keyes' trademark wit and warmth while tackling the issue of domestic violence.

4. *The Color Purple* by Alice Walker (Orion Books, £7.99) Focusing on black women living in Georgia in the Thirties, this absorbing book is told from the viewpoint of Cecile who has been oppressed by men her whole life. The scenes of violence aren't an easy read. But they're certainly an important read.
