to mark the 50th anniversary of the Hammersmith Society.



# Safe as houses

Local crime levels fell to an all-time low last year, falling by 15 per cent according to the latest Met Police figures. The statistics reveal that there were 3,295 fewer crimes in the borough in 2013 compared to 2012. This amounts to a 21 per cent reduction in personal robberies and 18 per cent fewer burglaries; vehicle crime is also down 21 per cent.
